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wo years on from hosting the last European Transplant & Dialysis Games in Dublin it was time to go on the road again and travel to Zagreb, Croatia to join 27 other countries in this biennial celebration of life through sport.

We had a great build up to our departure with letters of support from so many different sources. The personal message of support from members of the Irish Olympics team resonated well with our team and we were all ready to perform when we got to Zagreb!

With a team of 26 athletes and 21 supporters we were one of the bigger teams at the Games. The team was wonderfully diverse; ranging in age from 18 to 74 years old, with 6 people on dialysis and 7 members who had not travelled away with us before.



bout four weeks before the Games I went to the ALSAA Sports Complex for the final team meeting before we flew out to Zagreb, Croatia. I was introduced to all the team members and they all, without exception, seemed so nice, friendly and welcoming but little did I know just how fantastic this group of people would turn out to be.

I am currently receiving haemodialysis treatment in Midlands Regional Hospital in Tullamore. I only started my treatment in January 2012 so it is still relatively new to me. I must say that I was a small bit apprehensive about getting dialysis in a hospital in a different country but I am glad to report that the dialysis treatment that I and the others from the Irish team on haemodialysis received was absolutely second to none. The nurses and other staff in the hospital were excellent and they treated us so well.

When we were on our way to the Opening Ceremony, I was informed by our team captain, Harry Ward, that I was selected to be the flag bearer for the Irish team in the Opening parade. What an honour that was for me to carry our national flag.

I didn't think that the week could get any better after that. Well it did. I took gold in my darts competition and a silver medal in the bowling. The support and


hey say that lightening does not strike twice, but I have just come back from the 7th European Transplant and Dialysis Games with the same feelings I had on my return from my first European Transplant & Dialysis Games experience in Germany in 2008.

On both occasions I enjoyed a wonderful feeling of excitement, optimism and determination to keep myself as well as possible having spent the week with a wonderful, exciting and inspiring group of people that make up the participants in Games. As in 2008, this year I have made new friends who are now part of my extended family in Transplant Team Ireland.

When I attended my first Games I was on dialysis, this time around I am transplanted. I received the 'gift of life' from my donor and their family last year. Is there a difference in attending the Games whilst on dialysis or as a transplant recipient? There is the obvious practical one of having to dialyse and not having to dialyse. Beyond that, the answer will probably vary from person to person.

I believe that there can be a difference in what you personally take away from the Games when you are on dialysis and when you are transplanted. After my first Games I came away not feeling alone, I was always very active in participating in sporting activities and realised that I could continue being active while on dialysis and have participation in the Games as a goal.

On returning from Zagreb my focus is different again. In attending the Games I have realised that, like my fellow competitors, I need to try to keep myself as fit and active as possible and honour my donor by trying to live



as full a life as possible in all that I do. In relation to my donor and their family, I want to show the same spirit of generosity to others that they have shown to me.

We flew to Budapest and then travelled onwards by bus to Zagreb which was to be our base for the week. We arrived late in the evening at our hotel and were glad to get some rest. It was not until the day after our arrival in Zagreb that I began to get to know some of the team members and supporters. I had to go to the Games registration for John who was away doing dialysis and that was my first real opportunity to get to know some of these new people in my life.

By the end of the week in Zagreb I had met every member of the team and



all the supporters. I am full of admiration for the sporting efforts of the Ireland team. They came third in the overall medals total. I particularly remember the day by the open air swimming pool. In the hot sun of Croatia the Irish swimmers put on a marvellous show collecting many medals along the way.

As a newcomer to this outing I remember most of all the comradeship among the group. If you did not know what was going on you could always

ask Colin or Harry; always on the ball looking after things. Harry, the team captain, could always be relied upon to inject a measure of humour at the right time. Colin, the solver of problems, had a message which I personally will not forget, when you travel abroad always keep your passport next to you.
