his year's Games saw our team travel to Durban, South Africa. Having lived in Southern Africa for many years I was excited that members of our sports team were going to have the opportunity to experience the wonders and beauty of Africa. The setting, the weather, the people and the organisation did not disappoint – it was truly an amazing experience!

Our backroom team played their part again. Harry Ward is the ace our team has that all other teams want. He is inspirational, he is thoughtful, he is hard working and he has a great sense of humour!



Members of the team forged new friendships and reconnected with old friends

he 19th World Transplant
Games held in Durban, South
Africa saw the coming
together of over 1000 athletes,
from 50 countries, to celebrate
life and the gift of organ donation. This
year's Games proved to be a
tremendous success from its electric
opening ceremony to its setting in the
beautiful Durban coast.

Transplant Team Ireland, consisting of 24 athletes, ranging in ages from 12 to 68, proved yet again to be an inspirational group of athletes. The standard of competition this year was at extreme heights, however, Team Ireland proved to be amongst the top athletes with a total medal tally of 34 medals; 12 gold, 10 silver and 12 bronze.

Aside from the huge winnings, Transplant Team Ireland, throughout the week, displayed a sense of comradeship and support for not only each other, but for the other teams involved in the Games that was truly awe inspiring. Transplant Team Ireland's sense of fairness and enjoyment is renowned at the Games. Members of the team forged new friendships and

reconnected with old friends, ensuring that they made the most of the experience both on and off the field. Importantly, Transplant Team Ireland often paid tribute to their organ donors and donor families.

Throughout the week the team members displayed utmost endurance and skill as they participated in events such as the 5km road race, 20km cycle, swimming events, badminton, tennis, squash, petangue, golf, bowling, lawn bowls and various track and field events. Kidney transplant recipient Sheila Gregan from Nenagh, impressively took gold in the Virtual Triathlon, an event that combined her times from the 5km road race, 20km cvcle and 400m freestyle swim. A keen sportswoman and avid triathlete, Sheila later commented that her way of showing thanks to her donor family and embracing the 'gift of life' she was given, was through sport.

New to Transplant Team Ireland, fifteen year old Andrew Duncan from Tipperary and Dublin man Brian Carney integrated into the team well and proved to be fantastic new additions. Andrew secured a total of four medals



across tennis, squash, badminton and table tennis while Brian secured three medals between golf and lawn bowls. Youngest team member Oisin O'Gorman from Lismore, Waterford took gold in badminton and bronze in the long jump. Oisin also got to meet up with his friend Johan from the South African team whom he first met at the World Transplant Games held in Gothenburg two years ago.

Transplant Team Ireland was constantly supported and encouraged by the Team Manager Colin White and the athletes were tended to and cared for by Doctor Yvonne Ryan and our Physiotherapist, Sinead O'Regan.

The 19th World Transplant Games in Durban proved to be an amazing week of competition and friendship. The team enjoyed fine weather, fantastic facilities and stunning scenery. Transplant Team Ireland embraced their surroundings; members went on Safaris, some went for a dip in the Indian Ocean and some brave members even bungee jumped from the Moses Mabhida Stadium.

The message of celebrating life through sport resounded from beginning to end. Transplant Team Ireland athletes proved to be fantastic ambassadors for Ireland, exceptional athletes and shining examples of the successes of organ donation.

he World Transplant Games in Durban was a fantastic and amazing experience. I was encouraged by staff in Temple Street and those who we met at training meetings in ALSAA earlier in the year to travel to the Games with Andrew, who had a kidney transplant only a year previously. I really had no idea what to expect and initially was more concerned about the length of the flight than anything else.

We had our 'jabs' in May, most professionally done, and listened to a positive and motivational speech by Niall Quinn – not to mention we met the most important member of the team who I believe has travelled extensively, and at one point was "kidnapped" – 'Tadhg', our team mascot. W,e as a family, were warmly welcomed as 'first-timers' by other team members even though they had travelled to the Games many times.

There was a great sense of excitement at the Clarion hotel before we left for the airport. The athletes were there with family members and


supporters, along with the media. As we arrived in Durban on Saturday evening we were informed we had already been 'on the telly'. At the airport in Durban there was a real sense of team spirit, the pride of being on the Irish team became a reality as we encountered the other teams in their national colours.

It was really the following morning, Sunday that I became aware of what a huge event this was. At "The Save Seven Lives Beach Walk", which launched the event, I had an opportunity to meet other parents and transplant recipients. It was a great opportunity to talk and to learn about other people's experiences. Later that day, at registration, I saw the formality and official side of the Games. Nothing was left to chance and I was very impressed with the medical support.

The other athletes on the Irish team were supportive, encouraging and a mine of information. I realised that this was a high powered sports event at world level. I quickly learned the ropes: up early, breakfast, get the coach to the event, register and then on with the competitions.

They were truly wondrous experiences. I met people from literally all over the world both competitors and supporters. Competition was relentless and one could never describe the pride of being with a child representing their country. Of course the winning of medals is a tremendous bonus.

The team camaraderie and bonding was amazing. The juniors were so encouraged and respected by the more experienced athletes. We have gained a new sense of a wider family, confidence and hope and I would strongly encourage everyone to participate.












